Teaching Our Youth By Leota Harper

Remember now thy Greater in the days of thy youth, while the evil days came not, nor the years draw nigh, when thou shalt say, I have no pleasure in them; Ecclesiastes 12:1.

When children are brought up in the ways of the Lord in their older days they are not as likely to depart from this. An example and a good one is--the life of Christ. He was taught while very young by Mary and Joseph and at the age of twelve was teaching. When his parents took him up to Jerusalem to worship, they missed him on the return trip home. They went back to the temple and found him there teaching among the very learned men and amazing everyone by his knowledge. Mary and Joseph asked him why he had done this. He replied, "Know you not that I must be about my father's work?" Even his parents were puzzled at this at the time. But take a look at his later life--did he ever depart from his father's way? Of course not. He was always busy teaching and preaching his father's word.

Another example of a child which has been brought up in the way of the Lord is found in II Kings 22, when King Josiah came to the throne at the age of eight and remained king until he was thirty-nine. He was brought up in the ways of the Lord and he was faithful after he became a grown man. When he was reigning he had the idols destroyed. This is revealed in II Kings 23 and in this chapter we read where King Josiah was slain because of his good works. We know that if it was profitable to train the young in those days, it is just as important to do so now. Let us remember this passage in Ecclesiastes 12:1.
