BETTER SINGING

Singing is a vital part of our worship to God. God gave us our ability to sing and whether or not the quality is faultless, who can say that it is not acceptable, if sung in the spirit and understanding? However, the best we can do is never too good.

Ministers study to be able to speak with correct diction and enunciation; for these faults can mar the finest sermons and cause the congregation to miss important points. Noticable mistakes do not promote interest.

Let us consider our singing, and some ways in which we may improve.

Do we start singing at the first of a song or catch in at about the second line? A good beginning in anything is preferable.

BREATHING should be deep and natural; a breath at the end of a phrase, or after a semicolon or comma should be sufficient. Do NOT cut words into by a breath. Here is an example of splitting words:

How firm a found-(breath) ation,
 Ye saints of the Lord,
 Is laid for your faith
 In His ex-(breath) cel-lent Word.

Or:

What a Friend we have in Je-(breath) sus.

Consider this mistake and take more breath just before the word usually broken by a breath.

PRONUNCIATION is harder in singing than in speaking, therefore, care must be taken to pronounce words correctly. Do we almost always leave off consonants at

the end of words? They should be pronounced plainly , though not exaggerated. Notice the words of this song

Rock of Ages, Cleft for me,
Let me hide myself in Thee;

Do we sing it like this:

Rock o' fages, clef' bor me,
Let me hide mysel' fin Thee:

A song can easily be ruined by careless pronunciation.
