TRUE WORSHIP

THE LORDS SUPPER

God has always required his people to celebrate in memory of important events in his dealings with them. The children of Israel kept the sabbath day in memory of their deliverance from Egyptian bondage. "And remember that thou wast a servant in the land of Egypt, and that the Lord brought thee out thence through a mighty hand and by a stretched out arm; therefore the Lord thy God commanded thee to keep the sabbath day." (Deut. 5:15). The feast of the Passover was kept as a memorial of the time the Lord smote with first born of all the Egyptians and spared the firstborn of the Israelites. Ex. 12:14

The greatest event in the history of God's dealings with man is the death of Jesus Christ for men. It is appropriate that something be kept in memory of this the greatest of all events. Furthermore it seems that Jesus Christ made for their sins by obedience to his commandments, are the appropriate ones to keep this memorial.

Jesus Christ realized the need of such a memorial and instituted one even before his death. Methew, Mark, and Luke, record how Jesus instituted this memorial feast as he kept the feast of the passover with his disciples on the night in which Judas Iscariot betrayed him.

Paul wrote to the church at Corinth saying: "For I have received of the Lord that which also I delivered unto you. That the Lord Jesus the same night in which he was be-

trayed took bread; and when he had given thanks, he brake it, and said, Take eat; this is my body, which is broken for you: this do in remembrance of me. After the same manner also he took the cup, when he had supped, saying, This cup is the new testament in my blood; this do ye, as oft as ye drink it, in remembrance of me. For as often as ye eat this bread, and drink this cup, ye do shew the Lord's death till he come. Wherefore whosoever shall eat this bread, and drink this cup of the Lord, unworthily, shall be guilty of the body and blood of the Lord. But let a man examine himself, and so let him eat of that bread, and drink of that cup. For he that eateth and drinketh unworthily, eateth and drinketh damnation to himself, not discerning the Lord's body. For this cause many are weak and sickly among you, and many sleep" (I Corinthians 11:23-30).
