

### BE CAREFUL ABOUT RUTS

Connecting two Canadian towns 43 miles apart is said to be a road of which the first section is a broad modern pavement. After 18 miles of concrete, however, the pavement ends abruptly, a primitive dirt road begins; and a description of this unimproved stretch is given by a huge sign which stands at the beginning of it.

The sign reads:

"Be careful which rut you get into;  
You will stay in it for 25 miles."

This is a parable of life: At first in childhood and youth we race along what is a broad and beautiful highway; but after a certain point, when habit-patterns have become set, when the necessity for earning a living has imposed a prescribed routing, when our way of life has fallen into a definite pattern, we are likely to continue unchanged until we die.

It is for this reason that all decisions and especially those made in youth are of such great importance; and it is for the same reason that religion insists that every choice must be made in the light of the most far-seeing wisdom. The decision which you make today may well determine the course of your life for the next twenty-five years.
